Report of the County Education Officer

Recommendations:

- (1) That the Cabinet consider and comment on the Action Plan prepared jointly by the Local Learning & Skills Council and the County Council in response to the Area Review of 14-19 Provision.
- (2) That the comments of the Cabinet and those of the Warwick Area Committee on the Action Plan be forwarded to the Local Learning & Skills Council.

1. Background

- 1.1 The Cabinet will recall that the Local Learning & Skills Council (LLSC) and the County Council jointly commissioned a review of 14-19 provision in Central Warwickshire and Southam. The outcomes of the Review have been considered by both the Cabinet and the Warwick Area Committee.
- 1.2 At its meeting on 30th June Cabinet subsequently endorsed the Review's recommendations, a summary of which is attached as **Appendix A**.
- 1.3 An Action Plan has now been prepared which seeks to respond to the recommendations of the Review and the comments of the Cabinet and Area Committee. The proposed Action Plan has been the subject of wide consultation with schools, colleges and training providers, and other stakeholders, including the Department of Libraries, Heritage & Trading Standards (LHTS). It has also been cross-referenced with the Lifelong Learning Strategy prepared by LHTS.
- 1.4 The proposed Action Plan, which is attached as **Appendix B**, was discussed at the Warwick Area Committee meeting on 22nd November. Members welcomed the Action Plan as a clear and coherent response to the Strategic Area Review (StAR) and made the following observations:

- There was support for the collaborative activities between schools, particularly where this enabled a broader range of subjects to be offered, and enabled minority subjects to be taught in viable groups. However, the Local Authority needed to be aware that this incurs increased transport costs, which are currently supported through time-limited funding.
- There was concern raised that the funding to support collaborative vocational learning opportunities for 14-16 year olds will disappear with the ending of the current European Social Fund contract for Year 10 pupils in 2006. This will affect in excess of 110 learners in Year 10 in the Central Area from September 2006 and a further 350 across the rest of the County.
- The role of the Local Authority in encouraging specialist schools to plan across the Central Area when deciding on a second specialism was welcomed.
- Area Committee members would like to see continued efforts to encourage non-stereotypical take-up of plans on vocational courses for both boys and girls.

2. The way forward

- 2.1 The Cabinet is asked to consider and comment on the proposed Action Plan.
- 2.2 The views of the Cabinet and those of the Area Committee on the proposed Action Plan will be forwarded to the LLSC.

CENTRAL AREA ACTION PLAN Summary of Area Review's Key Recommendations

Curriculum

Build on current collaborative planning to:

- Extend choice for learners, e.g. range of applied A levels, range of level 2 provision post 16.
- Improve cost effectiveness, e.g. review viability of small groups.
- Reflect the aspirations of young people and the needs of the local labour market.

Specialist and CoVE Status

- Improve the sharing of specialist expertise between schools and colleges, e.g. collaboration between providers with the same specialisms.
- Ensure specialisms acknowledge the needs of the local labour market, e.g. need for construction and health and social care in the central area, planning across the area for second specialisms.

Education and Business

• Improve level of engagement between employers and schools, e.g. improved links with training providers, development of a local business forum.

Information and Communication Technology

• Ensure effective use is made of PFI "Toolkit" and that senior staff all have a common understanding of what constitutes "good practice".

Information, Advice and Guidance

- Ensure that all 14-19 year olds have access to impartial information and guidance about opportunities for the next stage of education and training, e.g.
 - receiving information about open evenings from <u>all</u> providers
 - receiving information about opportunities in work based training
 - maximising the benefits from the Connexions service.

Inclusion

- Continue to build upon existing and impressive policies by:
 - enhancing links between mainstream and special schools
 - analysing exclusion data
 - addressing gender gaps in performance
 - continuing to develop provision for gifted and talented learners.



Access, recruitment and participation

- Increase access to the full range of 14-19 opportunities through, e.g.
 - flexible learning opportunities with providers other than schools
 - addressing barriers to collaborative activities, eg transport.

Standards

- Continue the general trend of improvement with a particular focus on:
 - schools where 5 A*-C grades have remained static or declined
 - value added from key stage 3-4.

Progression

 Maintain progression figures for those completing learning opportunities and attempt to increase the numbers entering positive destinations from work based learning.

INTRODUCTION

This Action Plan is prepared in response to the 14-19 Area Review of Education and Training in Central Warwickshire which was undertaken between September 2004 and March 2005.

The Review took place in a spirit of cooperation and partnership between all concerned – the schools, colleges, training providers, the Connexions Service, the Warwickshire Education Business Partnership, local employers, the Warwickshire Local Education Authority, and the LLSC. The Review found a great deal of excellent practice, with much to be celebrated. It also found some potential areas for further development, many of which had been suggested by the Ofsted Area Wide inspection which took place earlier in 2004.

The Plan is an attempt to build on existing good practices, address identified areas for further improvement, and is reflective of the LLSC's, Warwickshire LEA's, and the Connexions Service's commitment to:

- Maximising opportunities and achievement for all 14-19 learners by innovative and inclusive approaches to collaborative working.
- Supporting all young people to become independent, confident, and committed learners with high aspirations.
- Preparing young people to enjoy success in lifelong learning, in skilled employment, and, if appropriate, in higher education.
- Encouraging all providers, employers, and other stakeholders to take collective responsibility for diverse education and training that prepares young people, as well as possible, for adult life, employment, and to serve the needs of the community.

The review made recommendations under the headings of:

- 1. Curriculum
- 2. Specialist and CoVE status
- 3. Education and business
- 4. Information and Communications Technology
- 5. Information, advice and guidance

- 6. Inclusion
- 7. Access, recruitment, participation, retention and completion
- 8. Standards
- 9. Progression
- 10. Collaboration

The following pages take each of these recommendations in turn and show the ways in which partners will work together to address them. Crucial to the Plan is the need for greater and wider collaboration between education and training providers. The Central Area is fortunate in having in post a 14-19 Area Coordinator and, already, significant progress has been made.

The Plan has been developed and will be monitored under the auspices of the Central Area 11-19 Panel, the Warwickshire County Council Cabinet, the Overview and Scrutiny committees, and the Full Council of the Local Learning and Skills Council. Drafts have been provided to other potential partners and stakeholders through existing forums in order to ensure widespread consultation. Each action has a lead agency (underlined) that will be responsible for reporting on progress to the termly panel meetings and will form part of the Area Coordinator's Progress Reports.

The Plan is very much a working document and any comments or suggestions regarding its content are most welcome.
