General remarks:

The areas visited are all surgical wards and Guy and Oken, as orthopaedic wards, always seem to be particularly busy.

The general appearance of the wards was bright and clean. Not surprisingly, there are never enough storage facilities, however, efforts had been made to reduce clutter and to ensure a clear pathway in both public and ward areas.

Guy Ward had two patients in single occupancy rooms who were being 'barrier nursed' because of infections. The infections had been a direct result of orthopaedic injury eg. organisims from soil where the patient had fallen. In Oken Ward three patients with MRSA were being 'barrier nursed' in single occupancy rooms.

Forum members noted the following:

Beaumont and Willoughby

Beaumont:

One toilet out of order No paper towels in kitchen area Sluicemaster was dirty No nurse's apron in container near ward bay entrance.

Willoughby:

Skirting board near ward entrance was dirty Sluicemaster dirty around the rim Mirror in sluice splashed and dirty Dripping tap in C122 bay Toilet rim dirty Vacuum suction dusty One fan with dirt and fluff

Guy and Oken Wards

Guy Ward:

Bathroom – splash back under the sink needs screwing onto

the wall

Commode wheels dirtySome fluff on air vent

- Umbrella hung up from a rail.

Oken Ward:

Male WC - screw from disability rail needs screwing back into the wall.

In all wards there does seem to be plenty of Infection Control notices and posters advocating handwashing. However, the proliferation of notices on different topics can be counter productive and a very informative infection control notice for visitors pinned onto a door in Guy Ward was probably hardly noticed as visitors walked past the door into the ward.

Forum members would like to see some large notices (EG. Stop signs) at the entrance to wards drawing visitors attention to the use of handgels. During the inspection some visitors when questioned had not noticed the handgels. The young granddaughter of one patient toured the ward and insisted that every visitor had a "dollop" of handgel!

Forum members have, on previous occasions in other wards, also noted the rust marks on the floors made by the metal stands of the waste bins. This proves not easy to remove and we understand that the old bins are being gradually replaced and the new stands will not leave ingrained rust marks.

During our visits a forum member usually speaks to ward cleaners and asks them about their routine. It is worth noting that there are no cleaners available to any ward after 8pm. While appreciating that hospital wards are quieter during the night we hope that a way can be found to ensure that there are still some cleaning services available later in the evening.

The Forum intend to carry out a further 'spot check' of the wards in the near future to look at the improvements made relating to the hospitals Action Plan.

We would like to thank Hospital Hotel Services, ISS, the Modern Matron and members of staff from all the wards visited. They answered all our queries and gave of their time to show us everything we wanted to see.

- Forums members on previous occasions have commented on the rust marks surrounding the base of the sack holders, old bins are being replaced. The trust are now buying bins with rubber feet, the metal will not then be on the floor
- A note was made that at this moment in time there is no domestic service after 8.00pm. The trust are going to provide a service until 10.00pm from Sept/Oct time 07

Patients commented that the staff was good at using the hand gels and at washing their hands. However they felt that the message about the hand gel use had still not got through to all visitors. {Visitors questioned on the day had not used them}

Patients thought that the food was good and the nursing care had been excellent. There were no complaints about ward cleanliness. One patient remarked that the cleaner had cleaned under the beds! Other patients noted that the telephone/TV was costly.
