Expansion of Bridgetown Primary School, Stratford upon Avon

Report of Strategic Director for Children, Young People and Families

Recommendation

That the Lead Portfolio Holder approves the expansion of Bridgetown Primary School as detailed in the report.

1. Introduction

- 1.1 On 4 December 2009 the Portfolio Holder agreed to the Strategic Director carrying out formal consultation with stakeholders on proposals to expand Bridgetown Primary School. Formal consultations with stakeholders took place between 4 January and 28 February 2010.
- 1.2 Although it was originally intended that outcome of consultations would be reported to the Portfolio Holder in March 2010, this has been delayed to allow for further discussion with the Governing Body of Bridgetown Primary School. At a meeting on 30 July 2010 the Portfolio Holder agreed to publish statutory consultation on its proposal to expand Bridgetown Primary School.

2. Statutory

- 2.1 Statutory notices were published on 12 August 2010 and the representation period finished on 23 September 2010. A copy of the statutory information for the expansion of Bridgetown Primary School is attached as **Appendix A** to this report.
- 2.2 Under the School Organisation Regulations, as there have been no objections to the proposal, the matter can be determined by the County Council as the 'Decision Maker' up to the period of two months following the completion of statutory notices, which expires on 23 November 2010.

3. Confirmation of Decision

3.1 Given that there have been no objections to this statutory proposal the Portfolio Holder is now asked to consider approving the proposal to expand Bridgetown Primary school with effect from 1 September 2011.

Objectives

10. The objectives of the proposals.

Provision of additional school places to meet rising demand in the town of Stratford-upon-Avon. South of the River Avon and additionally a large housing development in the school's priority area. This is a popular, oversubscribed school with significantly improved performance and regarded as Good by OfSTED when it last visited in 2006..

Consultation

Governors of Bridgetown Primary School support the principle of the proposal and believe it could benefit the school and its pupils, but that support was conditional upon the production of satisfactory design plans. The Governing body has confirmed that it is satisfied with the latest set of plans and wishes to proceed.

The Headteacher of Alveston Primary School

The Headteacher states that she has no objection in principle to the proposal but feels that priority areas in the town need to be reviewed to reduce the amount of pupil movement across the town. The admission number of Alveston has been increased and perhaps its priority should be expanded accordingly.

Parents of Bridgetown Primary School

Five sets of parents made points including:

- Is there a long term pupil place planning strategy in place?
- Will the proposal meet any increased demand for places from the adjacent planned Kipling Road housing development?
- Should a new school be provided instead of extending Bridgetown in order to provide enough places for the long term?
- What physical changes will be made to the school?
- Will school traffic be a problem if the school is expanded.
- Will there be an impact on the amount of outdoor space at the

school?

- Concern that a larger school will impact on the surrounding houses.
- What about disruption to the education of pupils and health and safety risks?
- Will being larger have a negative affect on the school's character and reputation?
- Will the internal facilities be extended and improved enough to take the additional pupil?

Cllr Rolfe – Local Member

Cllr Rolfe supports the proposals as more pupils will be able to attend their local school. However, the housing development at Kipling Road and the slight rise in the birth rate will mean that the proposal will not solve the problem of over-development south of the river. A major concern is the increase in traffic outside the school which would result from higher pupil numbers. Road safety issues should be addressed before anything is decided.

Stratford-on-Avon Town Council

The Town Council made a detailed response, the main points being:

- The proposal is not a long term solution to the need for school places in the Town.
- Is there an overall strategy to manage the impact of the high levels of new housing.
- Developer contributions through Section 106 contributions should be used to provide additional school places.
- It accepts that the opportunity for improved class organisation is a potential benefit to Bridgetown School.
- A new school should have been provided instead of expanding Bridgetown.
- How will outdoor space for play and recreation be protected?

Stratford-on-Avon Area Committee considered this matter at its meeting on 17 March 2010, and noted the responses to the consultation.

Stratford-on-Avon has attracted significant numbers of new houses as the only town in South Warwickshire to be designated for large-scale housing developments. A large number of new houses have been built over the last 10 years and the number of additional children living in the town has resulted in some schools being full while others have year groups or some classes that are full.

Table 1 below sets out the number of pupils on roll in each primary school in Stratford in September 2009:

Three primary schools are currently operating above their physical capacity: Stratford Primary School, Shottery St Andrew's Church of England (Controlled) Primary School and St Gregory's Catholic (Aided) Primary School. From 2009 Bishopton Primary School was expanded, increasing its capacity from 22 to 30 pupils per year. With effect from 2010 admissions, the capacity of The Willows Church of England (Controlled) School will increase from 40 to 45 places per year and the capacity of Alveston Church of England (Controlled) School from 20 to 30 places per year.

Table 2 below shows that on the basis of demographic changes and new housing information available, it is estimated that the number of primary school pupils seeking Reception year places in the town will exceed current total places available in schools in the town by 2011.

In September 2008, the current Reception year capacity of Stratford Town schools was exceeded and was managed mainly by Bishopton, The Willows and Alveston schools admitting above their published admission limits. In 2009, the situation was much the same although Bishopton Primary School had been expanded. Although 2010 is forecast to be a smaller cohort than the previous two a large Reception cohort is forecast for 2011.

As well as ensuring that there are enough school places across the town, there is also an issue about whether the current school places are located where they are needed. Families should be able to secure a school place in a local school within a reasonable distance from their home. In the town of Stratford-on-Avon there is a degree of 'cross over' of pupils, with pupils living in one priority area attending a school in another area. Whilst most of this is due to parental preference, it can also happen if a school is unable to provide places for all of the children in its priority area. There is a particular problem in relation to Bridge Town Primary School where, due to new housing developments close to the school, it was unable to admit all of the applicants from its priority area for admission to the Reception Year Group in September 2008 and September 2009.

Bridgetown Primary School is a popular and successful one and a half form (45 places per year) primary school serving a large geographical area comprised of Stratford-on-Avon east of the river to the Tiddington Road, Loxley Road and the parishes of Atherstone-on-Stour, Clifford Chambers and Preston-on-Stour (excluding Sweet Knowle). Earlier in 2009 it was agreed that the Parish of Clifford Chambers would transfer to Welford Primary School with effect from September 2010. The population of the priority area has increased significantly as a result of a large new housing development very close to the school. A further phase of the development with some 100 dwellings is likely to come forward shortly, further exacerbating the demand for school places at Bridgetown Primary.

The school currently has 310 pupils on roll, an admission limit of 45 pupils per year, and a capacity of 315 pupils. Table 3 below sets out the number of pupils in each year group and shows the school to be above its admission number in four out of seven year groups. The school has a private early years provider on site.

In 2008 there were 61 applications from pupils living in the school's priority area for 45 reception places and therefore16 'in area' pupils were refused admission including pupils living in Clifford Chambers. In 2009 there were 83 applications from pupils living in the school's priority area for 45 reception places and therefore 38 'in area' pupils were refused admission. The September 2010 reception cohort is much smaller than in 2009 but Bridgetown Primary is full to its admission limit. A larger Reception cohort of 295 pupils is forecast for 2011, some 15 above the agreed Reception year capacity.

In order to address the need for school places within its priority area it is proposed to expand Bridgetown Primary School from 45 places per year to 60 places per year. Initially, it is

intended to apply the higher admission number to the reception year only with effect from September 2011 admissions.

An increase in the admission number of Bridgetown Primary would enable the school to provide more school places for pupils living in its priority area and also increase the number of pupils obtaining their first preference school and help to meet the demand for places in the town. A two form entry school would, over time, assist the school in organising its classes into single age groups. From 2011 the additional places would provide valuable capacity in the town. Other schools in the town are also benefiting from higher pupil numbers and although there may be impact on admissions to local schools in some years, in the long term, all schools in the town should have sufficient pupil numbers.

Expansion of successful and popular schools

- **25A.** (1) Proposals must include a statement of whether the proposer considers that the presumption for the expansion of successful and popular schools should apply, and where the governing body consider the presumption applies, evidence to support this.
- (2) Sub-paragraph (1) applies to expansion proposals in respect of primary and secondary schools, (except for grammar schools), i.e. falling within:
 - (a) (for proposals published by the governing body) paragraph 1 of Part 1 to Schedule 2 or paragraph 12 of Part 2 to Schedule 2;
 - (b) (for proposals published by the LA) paragraph 1 of Part 1 to Schedule 4 or 18 of Part 4 to Schedule 4
