Change to the Indicated Admission Number of Whitestone Infant School

Report of the County Education Officer

Recommendation:

That the Area Committee consider any comments it wishes to make to Cabinet concerning the proposal to reduce the Indicated Admission Number of Whitestone Infant School in Nuneaton.

1. Background

- 1.1 Following a request by the Governing Body of Whitestone Infant School, in July Cabinet agreed to consult stakeholders on a proposal to reduce the Indicated Admission Number at the school from 120 to 90 pupils per year with effect from September 2007 admissions.
- 1.2 Following the decision of Cabinet a formal consultation took place between 3rd October and 14th November. A consultation paper was sent to all local schools, neighbouring LEAs, Diocesan Authorities. The purpose of this report is to outline the response to the consultation and seek the views of the Area Committee for forwarding to Cabinet for a final decision.
- 1.3 A copy of the consultation document is attached at **Appendix A**.

2. Whitestone Infant School

2.1 The Governing Body of Whitestone Infant School has asked to reduce its IAN from 120 to 90 pupils per year with effect from September 2007 admissions. The school's actual intake of pupils falls below its published admission number and this, together with Infant Class Size Regulations requiring that no infant class may exceed 30 pupils, is presenting severe organisational and financial problems. The table below sets out the current year groups and class organisation at the school as at September 2005:



Table 1 – Number of pupils on roll as at September 2005

2.2 The current admission number of 120 means that if more than 90 pupils apply for admission, it must organise its Reception year group into four classes. School budgets are based mainly on the number of pupils it has. If Whitestone Infant School were admitting 120 pupils it would have enough funding to provide four classes in its reception year group. However, the school has only been receiving in the region of 91 to 95 applicants and this does not provide enough finance to appoint an additional teacher so that a fourth class could be created. A forecast of future pupil numbers is given in Table 2 below. This forecast suggests that future pupil numbers are unlikely to reach 120 per year.

- 2.3 An admission number of 90 pupils year would enable the school to plan future intake groups into classes of not more than 30. This greater certainty about pupil numbers would help with the long-term planning of school finances and resources.
- 2.4 It is considered that even with the lower admission number of 90 pupils per year, there would be enough places at Whitestone Infant School for all of the pupils in its priority area who wish to obtain a place at the school.
- 2.5 The lower admission limit would mean that Whitestone Infant School would take less pupils from the priority area of other schools and this would have a positive effect on pupil numbers in neighbouring schools. Forecasts pupil numbers up to September 2009 suggest that there would be sufficient school places in the area to meet parental demand.
- 2.6 Parents living outside the priority area of Whitestone Infant School would still be able to apply for places but under the admissions policy of the County Council would have a lower priority for admission than pupils living in the priority area. Anyone refused a place at a preferred school would have the right of appeal to an independent appeals committee.
- 2.7 If the admission number for the school is reduced to 90 pupils per year, one less classroom will be used as teaching base in 2007. It is intended that over the next three years, three existing classrooms will be changed to enable community use. Under the Department for Education and Skills 'Net Capacity' regulations, changes in the use of rooms will reduce the school's capacity to 270 pupils.



3. Response to the consultation

3.1 There have been just two responses to the consultation, both of which are supportive. The points made in the responses are as follows:

Wembrook Primary School

The headteacher supports the proposal as 'a sensible idea'. The letter confirms that 'We foresee no concerns from Wembrook'.

A parent of Whitestone Infant School

The parent says that the proposal would be an improvement in the admission arrangements and says 'thank you for working hard to make a difference and to improve the environment at the school'. The parent also raises issues about the age of admission to schools in general, within the current education system.

4. Summary
