Nuneaton Princes Ave junctions with Bracebridge St & Norman Ave.

That these proposals should be withdrawn, pending a whole area review into parking to be carried out on completion of the A444 Coton Arches works and if approved the re-opening of Bermuda Bridge.

Nuneaton, Pool Bank Street – Proposed 'Loading only Bay'

That these proposals be withdrawn, pending further discussions with affected businesses into alternative locations, with further proposals to be advertised at a later date if applicable.

1. Introduction

- 1.1. Proposals for waiting restrictions both new and revised along with disabled bays at various locations within the Borough of Nuneaton & Bedworth were published in the local press in Nuneaton, on 4th October 2018 and a consultation was carried out in accordance with statutory procedure.
- 1.2. The following proposals received objections and comments; these are discussed in sections 2,3 & 4:
 - Nuneaton, Princes Avenue junction with Bracebridge Street & Norman Ave. – 'No Waiting at any Time'
 - Nuneaton, Pool Bank Street Proposed new 'Loading Only Bay'
 - Nuneaton, Jodrell Street,- 29m revocation of 'No Waiting at any Time'

- 1.3. A number of other proposals were included in the advertisements but received no objections. It is therefore recommended that those proposals be implemented as advertised.
 - Nuneaton, Croft Road Proposed removal of 'No Waiting at any Time'
 - Bulkington, Withybrook Road junction with Shilton lane Proposed 'No Waiting at any Time'
 - Bedworth, Croft Rd junction with Newtown Rd- Proposed extension of 'No Waiting at any Time'
 - Nuneaton, Croft Road- Extension to 'No return times to Limited waiting bays'
 - Nuneaton, Abbey St, Church St & Justice Walk- Extension to 'No return times to Limited waiting bays'
 - Nuneaton, Cedar Road, Cooper Beech Rd- Extension to 'No return times to Limited waiting bays'
 - Nuneaton, Clinic Drive- Extension to 'No return times to Limited waiting bays'
 - Bulkington, Chequers St & Leicester St- Extension to 'No return times to Limited waiting bays'
 - Bulkington, Leicester St Extension to 'No return times to Limited waiting bays'

2. Nuneaton, Princess Avenue junctions with Bracebridge St & Norman Ave – Proposed New 'No Waiting at any Time'

2.1. A request was received to implement 'No Waiting at any Time' (Double Yellow lines) at these junctions for reasons of road safety, improving the visibility for vehicle users and maintaining the free flow of traffic.

Statutory Criteria for Decisions on Making Traffic Regulation Orders and Parking Orders

Various Roads, Nuneaton & Bedworth Borough – Proposed Waiting Restrictions, On-street Parking Places and Residents' Parking Permits – Variation 02


- 1. The Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 enables the Council to implement Traffic Regulation Orders (TROs) for one or more of the following purposes:-
 - (i) avoiding danger to persons or traffic;
 - (ii) preventing damage to the road or to buildings nearby;
 - (iii) facilitating the passage of traffic;
 - (iv) preventing use by unsuitable traffic;
 - (v) preserving the character of a road especially suitable for walking and horse riding:
 - (vi) preserving or improving amenities of the area through which the road runs:
 - (vii) for any of the purposes specified in Section 87(1)(a) to (c) of the Environment Act 1995 in relation to air quality.
- 2. TROs are designed to regulate, restrict or prohibit the use of a road or any part of the width of a road by vehicular traffic or pedestrians. Permanent TROs remain in force until superseded or revoked.
- 3. TROs must not have the effect of preventing pedestrian access at any time, or preventing vehicular access for more than 8 hours in 24, to premises on or adjacent to the road. This restriction does not apply if the Council states in the order that it requires vehicular access to be limited for more than 8 hours in 24.
- 4. The Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984 also enables the Council to make orders authorising the use of part of a road as a parking place without charge, for the purpose of preventing or relieving congestion, and enables the Council to make orders designating parking places on highways with a charge. In determining what parking places are to be designated, the Council shall consider both the interests of traffic, and those of the owners/occupiers of adjoining property and in particular:-
 - (I) The need for maintaining the free movement of traffic;
 - (ii) The need for maintaining reasonable access to premises; and
 - (iii) The extent to which off-street parking is available in the neighbourhood.
- 5. In deciding whether or not to make any order, the Council is required to have regard to the matters set out in section 122 of the 1984 Act. Section 122(1) requires the Council to exercise the functions conferred on it by the 1984 Act as (so far as practicable, having regard to the matters specified in Section 122(2)) to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular and other



traffic (including pedestrians), and the provision of suitable and adequate parking facilities on and off the highway.

- 6. The matters to which the Council must have regard are:-
 - (i) The desirability of securing and maintaining reasonable access to premises;
 - (ii) The effect on the amenities of any locality affected, and the importance of regulating and restricting the use of roads by heavy commercial vehicles so as to preserve or improve the amenities of the areas through which the roads run:
 - (iii) The national air quality strategy prepared under Section 80 of the Environmental Protection Act 1995;
 - (iv) The importance of facilitating the passage of public service vehicles and of securing the safety and convenience of persons using or desiring to use such vehicles:
 - (v) Any other matters appearing to the Council to be relevant
- 7. Therefore, whilst the overall objective of the Council must be to secure the expeditious, convenient and safe movement of vehicular traffic, this will sometimes need to give way to the objectives in Section 122(2), and a balance has to be achieved between the overall objective and the matters set out in Section 122(2).






Nuneaton & Bedworth Borough variation 2 Nuneaton Princes Ave, Norman Ave & Bracebridge St Junctions

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

I am emailing to **formally object** to the proposals relating to proposals to introduce **No Waiting (Yellow Lines) in** Princes Avenue, Norman Avenue, Bracebridge St and Pool Bank St, Nuneaton, which are currently under consultation. As a community we have had some discussion among ourselves and I wish to object to the proposals on the following grounds:

1. The proposed scheme will reduce the total amount of parking available in the area.

As residents and users of the area we object on the grounds that the proposals will effectively reduce the amount of parking available in the areas affected by introducing No Waiting at Any Time (double yellow lines) along 5m stretches on the affected corners in Princes Ave, Bracebridge St and Norman Avenue, and in a section of Pool Bank St. As a community our general and long-standing opinion, which we have regularly communicated to you, has been, and will continue to be, that any moves which *seek to reduce the amount of parking space available* are not acceptable for both our current and future needs. In fact we are currently in discussion with you and with our local councillors about *reducing* some of the existing No Waiting at Any Time (double yellow lines) in our area, so are unhappy that further restrictions are being proposed separately to that discussion. We also objected in number to recent proposals to introduce No Waiting at Any Time (double yellow lines) and echelon parking bays in Marlborough Rd as recently as February this year (2018).

Ours is a vibrant and highly-populated community which needs to balance the varying and complex needs of family homes and other residential property with community spaces (mosques, churches etc) and local facilities (shops, pharmacy, park etc) and the situation we currently have, while not perfect, largely works. Introducing further restrictions into this complex relationship will result in extra difficulties and other possible, unforeseen consequences which we are very keen to avoid. As we have mentioned to you before, its we who need to actually live here, day by day, dealing with the

consequences of any new restrictions, so we feel we are in the best position to decide what is right for us and our streets.

2. The length of the proposed No Waiting at Any Time (double yellow lines) is excessive

As residents we appreciate the need to keep corners clear of parked vehicles and as a community we do endeavour to do this, and self-police, actively reminding residents and users of their responsibilities, and we are happy to do more in this regard if warranted. We object, however, to the proposed introduction of No Waiting at Any Time (double yellow lines) for 5m each side of the affected corners, which we feel would be excessive and result in a large net loss of parking capacity with no practical benefit. Depending on the way other cars are parked, 5m of restricted space could easily turn into anything up to 10m of unusable space (if the gap left between the last vehicle and the start of the yellow lines is too small to fit a vehicle without overhanging into the restricted zone). That's 10-20m per corner lost, multiplied by the number of affected corners; a substantial net loss of capacity in a region which needs to maximise its parking capacity, not restrict it further. This could have a major impact upon those of us who live here, and cause increases in tensions and community problems.

3. Any new changes should be deferred until the impact of impending major changes to highways and routes in Nuneaton are assessed.

Some major new changes to highways and routes are due in Nuneaton in the near future, including changes to the Coton Rd end of Edward Street and the new Bermuda Connection 2018 road into the western part of Nuneaton. We believe that these changes could have big impacts upon traffic flow and road usage through our area and feel it is important to assess what these impacts are before any new restrictions or changes are implemented.

In short, I, and members of the community, feel that these proposals are unnecessary and will only have a negative impact upon our ability to drive and park in the area concerned.

We are a very close and locally active community who are committed to making sure that the Local or County Council does not ride roughshod over our wishes, or impose schemes, restrictions or changes upon us that do not benefit us or which negatively/deleteriously affect those of us who actually have to live here.

Thus in light of the above objections, I ask you, as our public servants, to abandon the proposed changes as they are not suitable for our needs.

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



I am a resident of Pool Bank Street Nuneaton. I have lived here for 20 years.

The parking in this street is now at a ridiculous level and I cannot get a parking space during the day till after 6pm. This is because of people parking their cars here who are working in the town and the local businesses, who every day have multiple vehicles in the street and treat it as a car park. They have no common sense and no thought for other people only themselves. I am constantly being blocked in and so are my neighbours. By creating this loading bay which is in the middle of the street by the Crew, that will cause even more blocking of the street. What if I, or one of my neighbours, need one of the emergency services, they won't be able to get down here. It is a nightmare. I have lived here for 20 years like I said and it is now the worst I have known it. 



I am emailing in to **register my support** for the proposed lifting of the double yellow lines outside the properties indicated in Jodrell Street, Nuneaton.

As a resident of some 20 years, the need for double yellows on this stretch of road (and directly outside my house has always seemed unwarranted for the following reasons:

- This end of Jodrell Street is far wider than the bottom end (by Jodrell Court) where there are no restrictions yet there is still a junction etc.
- The double yellows stop a few houses down from ours and traffic flows freely after that point so seems unnecessary to therefore have them where we are.
- Cars have always parked on the double yellows (in contravention of the restrictions) and traffic movement has never been compromised by them being there (they've just earned revenue from fines!)
- Emergency service vehicles have always managed to get up and down the street even when cars are parked on the double yellow lines
- The Bed Shop delivery lorries have no issue accessing the premises to deliver stock even when cars are on the lines
- When Jodrell Court was being built, the construction company managed to get articulated lorries and cranes up and down the street with little issue despite cars parked on the double yellows
- There are not enough parking spaces up and down Jodrell Street for residents vehicles meaning that there are always times when residents have no choice but to park overnight on the lines and risk a ticket.

This will free up a few more spaces.

Additionally, I actually believe there is no reason why the double yellows could not be lifted outside ALL of the properties on BOTH SIDES of the street (rather than just one side from a properties at that point) and parking challenges would be clear (as there are no residential properties at that point) and parking challenges would be further alleviated. I therefore welcome the current proposal but would urge the council to actually consider taking these proposals further and removing the lines from the start of the houses on both sides.
