Expansion of Camp Hill Primary School, Nuneaton

Recommendation

That the Portfolio Holder approves the expansion of Camp Hill Primary School as detailed in the report.

1.0 Introduction

- 1.1 On 16 December 2010 the WCC Cabinet agreed to the Strategic Director carrying out formal consultation with stakeholders on proposals to expand Camp Hill Primary School. Formal consultations with stakeholders took place between 6 June and 15 July 2011.
- 1.2 At a meeting on 26 August 2011 the Portfolio Holder agreed to publish statutory consultation on the proposal to expand Camp Hill Primary School.

2. Statutory

- 2.1 Statutory notices were published on 15 September 2011 and the representation period finished on 13 October 2011. A copy of the statutory information for the expansion of Camp Hill Primary School is attached as **Appendix A** to this report.
- 2.2 Under the School Organisation regulations, as there have been no objections to the proposal, the matter can be determined by the County Council as the 'Decision Maker' up to the period of two months following the completion of statutory notices, which expires on 13 December 2011.

3. Confirmation of Decision

- 3.1 Given that there have been no objections to this statutory proposal the Portfolio Holder is now asked to consider approving the proposal to expand Camp Hill Primary school with effect from 1 September 2012.

Alteration description

The proposal is to increase the Published Admission Number and to build at the school to support the additional numbers.

The proposal will require the provision of four additional classrooms and a studio hall. It is also proposed to convert an existing space for additional dining facilities.

School capacity

The current capacity is 315. The prescribed alteration would see the capacity increase to 420.

(b) details of the current number of pupils admitted to the school in each relevant age group, and where this number is to change, the proposed number of pupils to be admitted in each relevant age group in the first school year in which the proposals will have been implemented; The current PAN is 45 with up to 45 children being admitted in each year group. The proposal is to increase the school from 1.5 FE to 2 FE and a PAN of 60. In September 2012 we would look to see up to 60 children admitted into reception. The increased PAN will then feed through the school year on year with 60 being taken in to reception each September thereafter.

(c) where it is intended that proposals should be implemented in stages, the number of pupils to be admitted to the school in the first school year in which each stage will have been implemented;

With effect from September 2012 admissions, the PAN will be 60 at reception. The PAN in other year groups for September 2012 will remain at 45. The increased PAN will then apply for reception feeding through the school one year group at a time.

Current pupil numbers show that over recent years the school has been close to capacity in reception. The school is in an area of regeneration and numbers higher up the school reflect a time where people were being temporarily re-located out of the area to support the redevelopment.

There is currently a significant demand for reception places in the area and the school have agreed to take above their PAN for September 2011 admissions.

The rise in the birth rate will have a significant impact on some areas of the county from 2011 in some cases and from 2012 in others.

Camp Hill has been subject to significant regeneration over recent years and housing development is continuing. There is already significant pressure on primary school places in the area and the Headteacher and Governors of Camp Hill Primary School have kindly agreed to take above their PAN in reception for 2011 admissions.

Numbers in the area are forecast to continue to rise as the impact of the rise in the birth-rate and the continued housing development in the area feed through into the school system.

Other schools in the area are already almost full or at capacity. To do nothing will mean that there will be insufficient primary school places available in the area.
