Report of the Area Community Learning Partnership

Recommendations:

- (1) That the progress made in the development of the Community Learning Strategy and the multi-agency Community Learning Plan for Rugby be noted.
- (2) That the Area Committee endorses the multi-agency Community Learning Plan for Rugby 2005/08.

1. The Area Community Learning Plan 2004/05

- 1.1 Community Learning is one of four priorities in the Single Education Plan which aims to provide a vision for learners across the County.
- 1.2 The development of the Community Learning Strategy and multi-agency Community Learning Plans enables the LEA and all partner organisations:
 - To engage in new ways with the local community, so that learners, parents and carers, and our partners are all working together to help learners of all ages to achieve their potential.
 - To enhance communication and understanding across the range of learning provision.
 - To ensure that increasingly complex arrangements for learning:
 - Are planned more coherently
 - Avoid needless duplication
 - Have agencies working together not in competition with each other
 - Seek to respond to the differing needs of local communities
 - Are subject to local democratic scrutiny.
 - To plan and co-ordinate their contribution to Area Business Plans and Community Plans.



- 1.3 The Area Community Learning Partnership (ACLP) is co-ordinated and serviced by the Education Department and is the vehicle through which the Area Community Learning Plan has been developed. The ACLP is the 'Lifelong Learning Theme Group' for the Rugby Forward (the Local Strategic Partnership).
- 1.4 The ACLP has met regularly since April 2003 and produced its first multiagency plan which was endorsed by the Area Committee on 5th May 2004.
- 1.5 Progress against the 2004/05 action plan was monitored by the Partnership on a regular basis and all partner agencies contributed to the process. A full progress report for 2004/05 is attached at **Appendix A**.

2. The Area Community Learning Plan 2005/08

- 2.1 Progress made against the Community Learning Plan for 2004/05 has been encouraging and has given partner agencies a firm basis to build upon when considering future working.
- 2.2 The ACLP met in early February to look at progress made against the 2004/05 plan as well as looking at what the longer term aims and visions for the area were.
- 2.3 There was a strong feeling that one-year planning can be restrictive and it was agreed that the next Community Learning Plan would have a three-year life span.
- 2.4 The 2005/08 Community Learning Plan includes an action plan initially focusing on the first twelve months of the plan. Six monthly reports will be made to the Local Strategic Partnership and Area Committee and the action plan will be amended as necessary to reflect changing need.
- 2.5 A copy of the Community Learning Plan for 2005/08 is attached at **Appendix B**.

FOREWORD

The Community Learning Plan has been produced by and on behalf of the Area Community Learning Partnership for Rugby Borough. This was formed in April 2003 and seeks to foster the broad range of learning opportunities available. It aspires to bring greater cohesion to the work of the various agencies, organisations and institutions which serve to meet the learning needs of all people in the wider area.

The Area Community Learning Partnership is the Lifelong Learning Theme Group of the Local Strategic Partnership, Rugby Forward. As such we need to have regard for the three priorities identified by Rugby Forward these being, Brownsover South, Rural Communities and the Town Centre (Alstom) area development. We also need to consider the other theme groups of Rugby Forward and work in partnership with them as appropriate.

It fully recognises the wealth of good practice in the field of community learning already established within the area, much of which is secured by agencies working in partnership. The Area Community Learning Partnership seeks to strengthen these ties and thereby 'add value' and further develop the capacity for joint working.

It must be noted that the Area Community Learning Partnership is not itself a provider of services nor a 'super-agency' attempting to oversee or direct the work of partners. It is a voluntary association of like-minded organisations who share a common belief in the virtues of learning and the merits of a collaborative approach where this is most appropriate.

The Area Community Learning Partnership believes that Education and Lifelong Learning is about the provision of opportunities for people of all ages to acquire skills and knowledge, whether it is to help them acquire formal qualifications, the skills for their job, or simply for the personal satisfaction that learning can bring.

The Area Community Learning Partnership reflects a multi agency approach to addressing the priority issues identified across the area. This document contains both an indication of some of the work already undertaken in partnership, as well as our plans and aspirations for the next three years. There will be an annual update to this plan.

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BACKGROUND INFORMATION ABOUT THE AREA

Rugby's population:

- Around 90,000 people live in the Borough of Rugby.
- The majority of these live in Rugby Town, but over 20,000 people live in small rural communities.
- The population of the Borough has remained stable over 25 years, but it is predicted to grow to 100,000 over the next 20 years, as the population ages.
- The redevelopment of the Station Area in Rugby town will also create a significant new community.
- Rugby's ethnic composition remains largely unchanged over the last fifteen years, with Indian (2.6%) and Black Caribbean (0.8%) being the largest minority ethnic groups.
- 2% of the population are Hindu (which is the third highest percentage out of 34 local authority areas in the West Midlands).

Rugby Borough is generally affluent:

- Average household income is £32,400 and has increased by 45% over the last six years and 17% over the last two years.
- Household income is higher and rising faster than national and regional averages.
- Over three quarters of working age people are in paid work.
- Less than 1,000 people claim unemployment benefits (classed as 'full-employment').
- Educational Attainment is slightly higher than the English average.

Some of Rugby's communities experience significant deprivation:

- Some 10% of households earn less than £10,000 per annum.
- The Index of Multiple Deprivation 2004 identifies one area of Rugby (in Brownsover South) in the 20% most deprived areas nationally, and a further three areas (in Overslade, Newbold on Avon and Newbold/Town Centre) in the bottom 30%.
- Rugby Borough includes a large rural population many of whom experience significant disadvantage accessing services and housing.

The Local Economy:

- Rugby has the highest concentration of manufacturing jobs in Warwickshire, employing a quarter of the local workforce.
- Manufacturing is in decline, both locally and nationally, and this is most starkly
 demonstrated locally by the significant loss of jobs at the Peugeot-Citroen plant
 in Ryton and the potential impact on local firms of the likely closure of MG
 Rover.
- Although general employment levels are high, significant and sudden redundancies are likely to lead to re-training and other community needs.



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Education, Skills and Training

- Although educational attainment is slightly higher than the English average six areas of Rugby are in the bottom 30% nationally with regard to Education, Skills and Training deprivation (measured by assessing (a) the educational attainment of children and young people, and (b) the skills and qualifications of the working age population).
- 23% of those responding to the West Midlands Household Survey in the age band 45 54 did not hold any qualifications. This proportion increased to 31% for those aged 55+.
- 25% of the respondents to the West Midlands Household Survey who belong to an ethnic minority do not hold any qualification.
- 34% of the respondents to the West Midlands Household Survey who had a disability do not hold a qualification.
- At ward level in the Borough there is a link between the level of social deprivation and proportion of the population not holding any qualifications.


WHAT IS THE AREA COMMUNITY LEARNING PARTNERSHIP?

The Area Community Learning Partnership is the Education and Lifelong Learning "Theme Group" of Rugby Forward. The Area Community Learning Partnership consists of representatives of local government, health, education bodies, business, and voluntary and community organisations. The Partnership operates by bringing the various agencies together to learn from and influence each other in the interests of the people of Rugby. This plan describes their commitment to cooperate in order to improve learning opportunities for people in the area.

The Partnership believes that Rugby should be 'a total learning community' where all members of the community are supported in achieving their full potential. All people should be treated fairly and equality of opportunity should be available for all. This will bring benefits to individuals, families, communities, the economy and the environment.

In order to achieve this we will need to make sure that:

- people can learn in places convenient to them whether this is at home, in a family setting, at work, in places dedicated to learning like libraries, schools and colleges, in a local community centre or elsewhere,
- the value of learning is understood by those making key decisions to ensure that the best possible learning resources are available. i.e. the best possible teachers, buildings, advice, guidance, equipment etc. are available to learners,
- full use is made of technology including computers to make learning available to everyone,



- barriers to learning have been reduced so that everyone has the chance to satisfy their learning needs,
- all organisations that provide learning work closely together to ensure that the needs of learners are put before the needs of their organisations so that the best use is made of available resources and learners can freely and easily move from one organisation to another.

WHAT HAS BEEN DONE SO FAR?

This section shows a few examples of the good partnership work taking place within the Rugby area. This is only an illustration of the work taking place and we hope goes some way to showing the diverse nature of the learning opportunities available within Rugby Borough.



Learning Zone Rugby Library in Adult Learners Week

Rugby Adult Education Forum is made up of Adult Education providers within the borough who work together to showcase adult learning. Adult Learners Week 2004 started with the Forum deciding to hold the event at Rugby Library and Information Centre. Funding from the Learning and Skills Council enabled a coordinator to be employed by the Forum to help organise an extensive showcase. The showcase was a great success 26 partners delivering 76 events in the library over one week.

Dean Richards OBE launched Adult Learners Week, talking to residents and mingling with the public. A range of workshops and tasters were available free to any adult wanting to attend. They varied from Circus Skills, Writing your CV, to how to play Bao (African game) and researching your family history. Without the partnership this could not have been achieved but we are all looking forward to another successful year.




Dean Richard OBE studying Gujarati online

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The Connexions Service in collaboration with the Rugby Library and Art gallery held a careers fair for local school pupils, parents, teachers and governors.

Over 40 local training, education and employment providers were present to give accurate and up to date information and advice about local opportunities for young people. Over 700 people attended the event.

Connexions which offers a range of services to young people aged between 13 and 19 held the event at Rugby Library to give both parents and young people up to date information on employment, training, education and community-based opportunities.

Connexions Personal Advisor Andrew MacPherson, who organised the event said he was pleased the annual event had been so beneficial. He said

"We held a prize draw at the event after young people filled in evaluation forms to help us work on making the event even better next year.

Originally we offered the winner vouchers but he specifically asked for a cheque to contribute towards him drum kit."

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The recent Area Community Education Council (ACEC) open evening was extra special and it was combined with a presentation of certificates to both young people and adults. The evening was attended by over 200 people of all ages. There were a variety of displays by organisations who are funded through ACEC grants, these included The Percival Guildhouse, The Bradby Youth Club, Young Carers, The Rugby Christmas Cracker and Warwickshire College, Rugby Centre.

The Rugby Youth Council hosted the evening, which began with a display of belly dancing by The Percival Guildhouse.



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Young people were presented with certificates for kayaking, music DJ ing and personal development gained through summer activities. Members of the Youth Council were also recognised with longstanding service awards.

Adults were awarded certificates in a variety of family learning courses as well as national tests in literacy and numeracy.

The Milap Asian women's group supplied the refreshments for the evening and the Nachda Punjab Bhangra dancers and young people from the Roots and Culture Youth Group provided further musical entertainment.

The evening was an excellent way for visitors to see the extent of work of taking place within the Borough with adults and young people all able to show the benefits gained from learning.

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A celebration of cultural diversity took place across Rugby schools. Children from all races performed together and passed on messages to older people about how to live in harmony.


The festivals were organised by Warwickshire Education Authority's Intercultural Curriculum Support Service (ICSS). James Shera, Director of ICSS, said
