Targets for New Local Area Agreement

Report of the Strategic Director for Environment and Economy on behalf of the Officers Group

Summary

The report proposes targets for the new Local Area Agreement.

Recommendation

That the targets detailed in paragraph 3.1 are endorsed.

1. Introduction

1.1 Negotiations are currently taking place with the Government Office for West Midlands (GOWM) concerning the details of the new Local Area Agreement (LAA). These centre on proposed targets. The national indicator agreed for Waste Management for the LAA is NI191 which is the number of kilograms of residual waste per household.

2. Assumptions Made in Determining Targets

- 2.1 The spreadsheet used to determine the targets is detailed at **Appendix A**. The main assumptions were:-
 - (i) For 2008/9 and future years waste is assumed to increase by 1% per annum excluding an adjustment for Hunters Lane.
 - (ii) In vessel composting (IVC) and alternate weekly (AWC) collections for Stratford and Rugby are assumed to commence near the start of 2009/10.
 - (iii) In vessel composting for Nuneaton, Bedworth and North Warwickshire is assumed to commence mid 2010/11.
 - (iv) Recycling and composting is assumed to increase by 5% per annum excluding the effects of IVC and AWC.



3. **Proposed Targets**

3.1 The proposed targets and related performance data is detailed below:-

Year	2008/9	2009/10	2010/11
NI191 – kgs of residual waste per household	746	702	671
NI192 - Household waste composted and recycled - %	39.99	43.50	46.00

- 3.2 It is understood that GOWM will agree to these figures.
- 3.3 The proposed targets are slightly more challenging that those in the County Council's Corporate Plan but the latter were prepared before we became aware of the likely out-turn performance for 2007/8. The out-turn was better than expected (e.g recycling/composting 35.37% compared with target of 33.97%) and it is therefore considered appropriate to adjust future targets. The main surprise for 2007/8 was that, subject to a final audit of the figures, total waste reduced by 4% on 2006/7. Even if the Hunters Lane Recycling Centre had been open all year, the reduction would still be 3%. Speaking to other authorities this is not an untypical reduction.
- 3.4 With the agreement of Officers, as part of the LAA preparation process, the above targets have been recommended for inclusion in the new LAA.

4. Financial Implications

4.1 Changes in collection, disposal and recycling arrangements have financial implications. Some can reduce costs and others increase costs. At the moment for waste disposal, increasing recycling and composting levels and diverting more waste away from landfill by these methods is generally cheaper than landfill. With collection, however, introducing the collection of additional materials has usually increased collection costs. Overall, whenever a new scheme is planned, then the cost of the scheme compared with alternatives would be evaluated by the Council concerned.
